Marilyn Baker

Marilyn lived in Fremont for more than 25 years and was always involved in the community. Marilyn served on the Conservation Commission in 1990 and 1991; moving to the Fremont Planning Board from 1991 to 2004; as an Alternate to the Conservation Commission 1996 to 2001; and on the Budget Committee from 1993 to 2004. She was also a member of the Historical Society and active in the People's United Methodist Church. She assisted with the Safety Complex Building Committee and helped at many elections counting ballots. Marilyn's husband Jack continues to be active on the Town's Zoning Board of Adjustment and in the church. Jack & Marilyn were recognized with the Town Report Appreciation Award in 2006.

Eleanor Gates

Eleanor had for many years, served as Grand Marshal of the Annual Memorial Day Parade and Observence. Eleanor was a World War II Veteran, serving in the US Army Nurses Corp. She moved to Fremont in 1957. Her son Donald Gates Jr has served for many years on the Board of Selectmen.

George Steele

George Steele, 97, holder of the Boston Post Cane for Fremont, died peacefully at home in August. George is fondly remembered for his constant cheerful humming and offering to share a mint. George was a US Navy Veteran, serving from 1942 – 1971, was a Chief Petty Officer and served in the Pacific in World War II on the cruiser Pasadena. He earned five Medals and entitled to wear a Silver and Bronze Star.

George Towle

George Towle was a Fremont native, born here June 5, 1921. He lived the last years of his life with his daughters in Arizona. George was a rural mail carrier in Fremont many years. He served in the US Army Air Corps during World War II. George was active in the Bicentennial Committee in 1963-1964.
