Ellis School Saves Six Trees in the Save the Trees Challenge!

Ellis School cancelled over 600 catalogs in its first Save the Trees Challenge. The Town's Daisy Girl Scout group launched the challenge and asked all Ellis students to participate. Why? Each year 100 million trees are sacrificed for the creation of junk mail in the US, creating greenhouse gas emissions equivalent to 3.7 million cars. Mrs Pipitone's seventh grade students helped the Daisies by counting and organizing the catalogs. Now if these 600 catalogs cancelled by Ellis don't show up in the mail 4 times in the next year, Ellis School has just saved 24 trees and 12,000 gallons of water...a huge accomplishment and a step in the right direction for our planet!

Philip A Pratt Memorial

Fremont Resident Philip A Pratt, aged 21, was killed in Vietnam on May 31, 1969. We honored Philip's Memory, and the 40th anniversary of his death, at the May 2009 Memorial Day Observance. Thank you to Irene Hitchcock for sharing the family's memorabilia.

In 1975 the Town of Fremont, NH dedicated on Memorial Day a monument in honor of Philip A Pratt. It is known as the Philip A Pratt Memorial Monument and is located next to the Sandown Road Bridge on Sandown Road in Fremont Village. Pratt was the only Vietnam Conflict casualty from Fremont.

Fremont sent 63 soldiers into the Vietnam Conflict between 1965 and 1973 of which Thomas Berry received two Purple Hearts, Philip A Pratt & William Teague each received 1 Purple Heart, and Wayne Carmichael was wounded during the Conflict.
