


MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Fremont Police Department is to protect our residents and all those who pass through our community by establishing high standards of impartial and professional law enforcement. We, as dedicated officers, must learn from the past, meet the present challenge and plan for the future.

2011 was a demanding year. We saw an increase in patrol activity; including 6271 calls for service, there was 1448 motor vehicles stopped that resulted in 103 summonses and 1345 warnings being issued. We arrested 111 individuals, had 214 court cases. As the Town of Fremont continues to grow, the strain on all emergency services also continues to grow.

As I reported in last year's annual report once again one of our own was called to duty and asked to serve our country. Sergeant Jason Larochelle a member of the 197th Field Artillery Brigade stationed in Manchester has returned and is once again serving the residents of the town. This was Jason's second deployment while he has been a member of the Fremont Police Department.

REMEMBER, YOUR BEST DEFENSE IS THE ABILITY OF YOU AND YOUR NEIGHBORS TO RECOGINIZE A POSSIBLE PROBLEM AND CALLING THE POLICE DEPARTMENT TO CHECK IT.

If you observe a crime or if it happens to you, be alert to what you observe and make mental notes of what you see and hear. It will help you maintain your presence of mind as well as helping the police later. Report a crime immediately. Time is a factor in apprehending a criminal and even a few minutes delay can mean his/her escape. But remember your safety comes FIRST.

Fremont is experiencing the same problems as many of our surrounding communities. We have seen an increase in the number of DAY TIME residential burglaries. Please be observant if you see any thing that seems suspicious call the Police Department. Keep an eye on your neighborhood. If you see a car, van or truck parked in a neighbor's yard and you do not think it belongs there, call us, let us check it. The vehicle may belong but if it does not you may save a neighbor and a friend a lot of heartache and aggravation.

When you leave your residence be sure to lock the doors and windows. If you are going to be gone for an extended period of time, come into the Police Department or go on to our web site obtain a "**Vacant House Check Form**" fill the form out and bring it to the police station. We will check your property while you are away. Be sure to cancel your mail and paper deliveries.

Leave a light on a timer, to give the residence the look that some one is home. Tell a neighbor you will be away.

An important part of our mission is our interaction with the children of the town, this is done many ways. We wish it could all be positive but there are time when it is not. We are blessed with a group of special people who call themselves

The Town of Fremont has adopted a number of ordinances, including Registering Alarm Systems, Dogs, Loud Unusual or Unnecessary noise, Parking, Snow Removal, Public Drinking, Speed Limits, Thru Trucking. The Police Department maintains a database that alerts us to persons with special needs in the event of an emergency, such as the need for power for life support and persons who need

special vehicles or are unable to leave their residence without assistance during an evacuation. This information is kept strictly confidential and is only available to the Safety Services responding to the event.

With the continuing financial support of many of our residents and local businesses, the cooperation and dedication of the staff at the Ellis School, and Mary Wheaton-Pinder of the Fremont Police Department, we are once again able to offer the DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) Program. The DARE Program started in the Ellis School in the fall of 1993. It is a 10-week program that is taught by a full time police officer that has completed a DARE instructor's program. Due to circumstances beyond our control we were not able to offer the program in 2009. In June 2009 Greg Huard became a member of the Fremont Police Department. Greg is a certified DARE instructor and he taught grades 5 and 6 this year. This included the class that did not receive the instruction in 2009.
