Glen Oakes Expansion Project



On Sunday June 11, 2023, Conservation Commissioners (and avid Open Space enthusiasts) Rich Cooper and Bill Knee put the Moose Plate Sign in the Glen Oakes Trail Kiosk.

The Town was pleased to recently acquire the 24-acre parcel 04-077 located off Copp Drive to expand the Glen Oakes Town Forest and Conservation Area. This parcel has long been on the radar of our Conservation and Open Space groups for its documented wildlife, natural resources and source water protection. Recently the property became available for sale and the conservation-minded owners worked closely with the Town to make the sale happen. The project, termed the “Glen Oakes Expansion” was funded by a grant from the NH State Conservation Committee Conservation Moose Plate Grant Program (\$30,000) and a grant from the Fields Pond Foundation (\$10,000). The balance of the purchase price came from Town Conservation Funds generated through Land Use Change Tax. These funds are comprised of a portion of the penalties paid by owners when land is removed from Current Use. Special thanks to Land Use Administrative Assistant Leanne Miner for her work on the grants!
